Trade Unions

- Ironworkers, coal miners, and other workers began to organize **trade unions**.
 - Unions bargained with employers for better hours, improved wages, and better working conditions
 - When collective bargaining failed, employees sometimes went on strike



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Susan B. Anthony

- In 1872 Susan B. Anthony tried to cast a vote in the U.S. presidential election.
- She was arrested and fined.



Emmeline Pankhurst

Campaigned in Britain for the right of women to vote

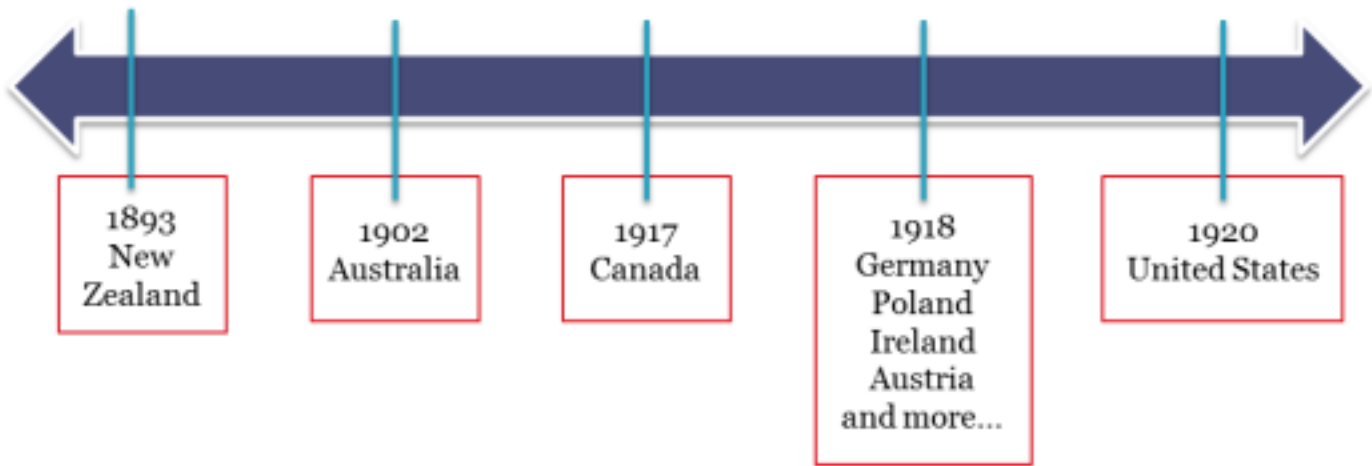
Interrupted political meetings

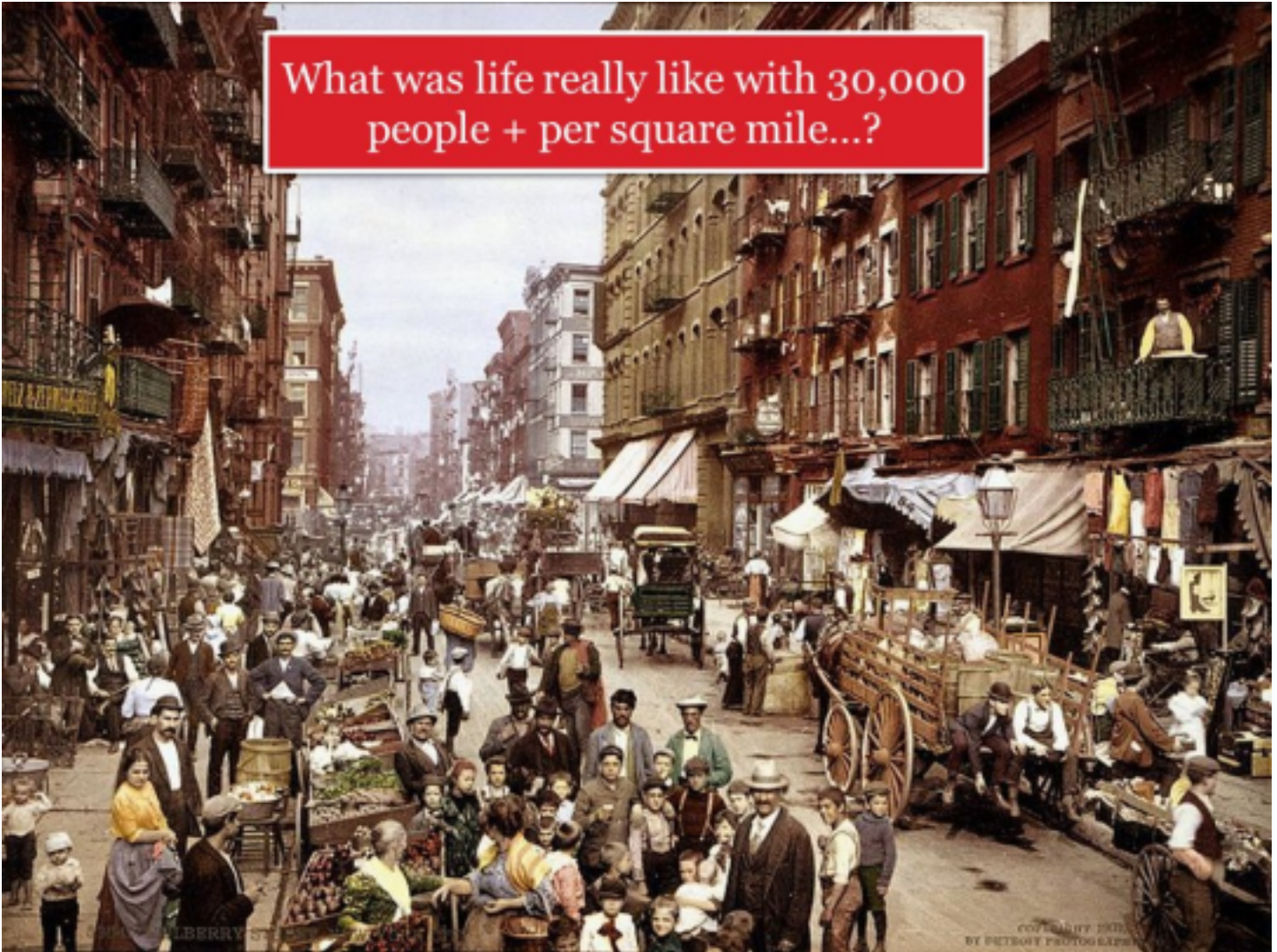


