8,000 miles

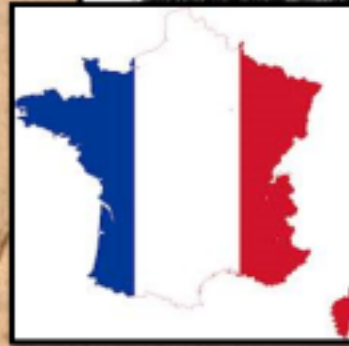

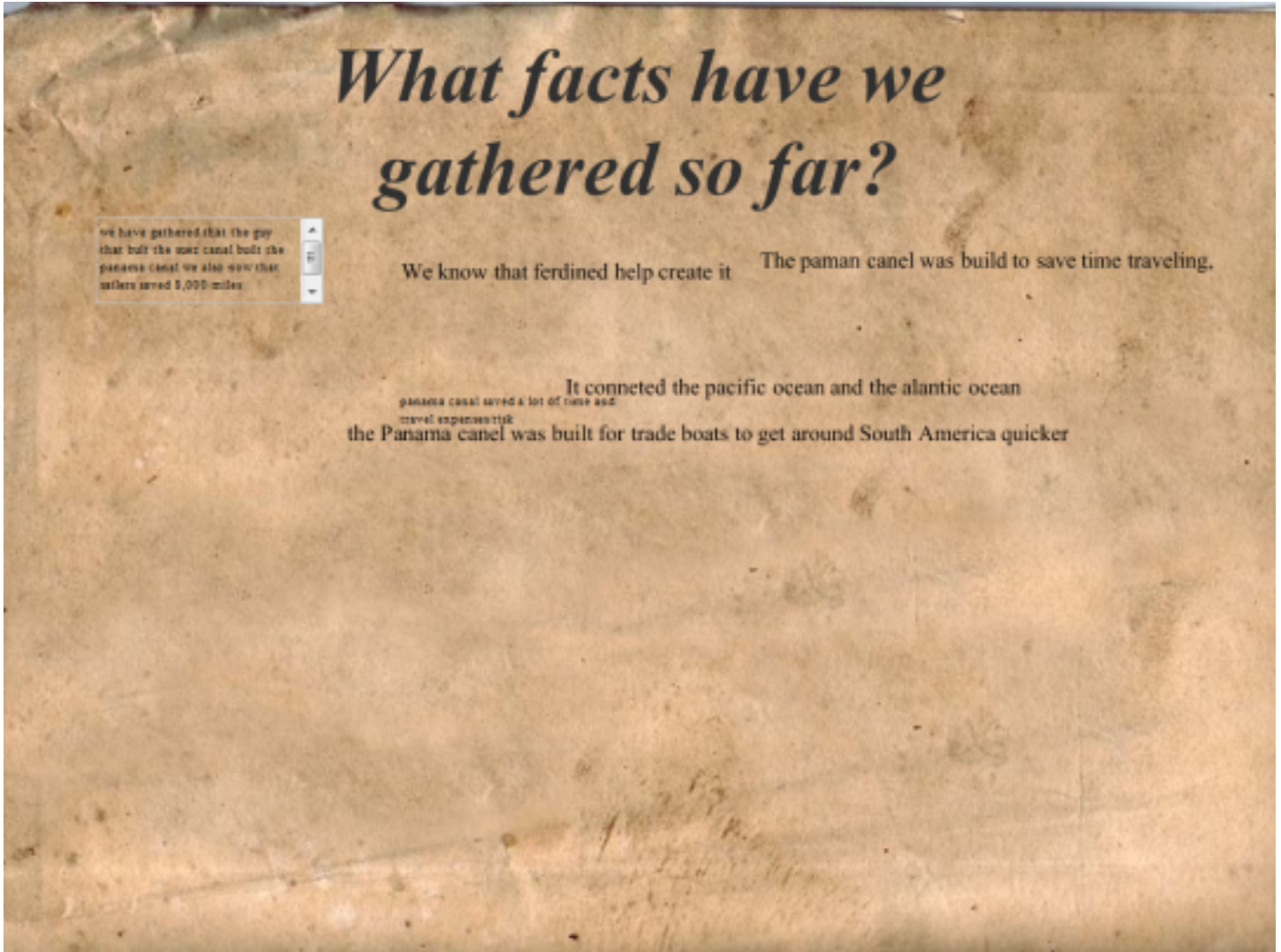
Ferdinand DeLesseps

- John Stevens- Chief engineer who realized a **series of locks** would be needed to connect the two oceans

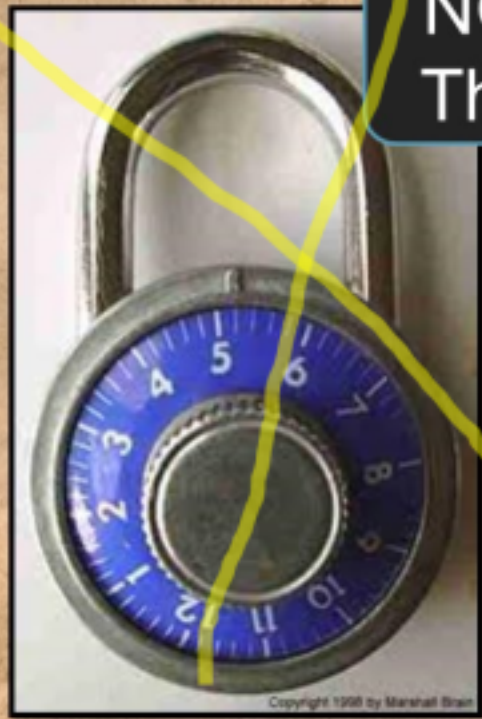


