

Elizabeth's Legacy

In 1603, Elizabeth died peacefully in her sleep. The remarkable queen had reigned for nearly half a century and transformed England.

When the young woman came to the throne, her realm was an inward-looking island perched on Europe's western reaches. But her shrewd insights and courageous leadership turned the island outward. Naval triumphs allowed the English to challenge Spain for control of the seas. English explorers and adventurers laid claim to previously unknown lands. In this time of growing national confidence,

genius flowered in the arts and drama. English men and women—from the boldest of adventurers to the humblest of city-dwellers—felt a new national pride.

By the end of the Elizabethan Age, England was a formidable power with international reach, and the champion of Protestantism in Europe. The nation had successfully challenged its rivals on the seas. It was forging worldwide trading networks. And it had begun to establish colonies in North America. England was poised to influence the course of the human odyssey for centuries to come.

- Edmund Spenser was a poet who wrote an epic poem called *The Faerie Queen*.

- He intended to write a poem that would be twelve books long. In each book, a knight met adventure and faced a trial to master a virtue, such as temperance, holiness, or courage.
- Spenser died before he had a chance to complete all twelve books.

- He drew his inspiration from Greek comedies and tragedies, Italian romances, and English history, as well as from street ballads and folk traditions.
- He first started his life in the theater as an actor

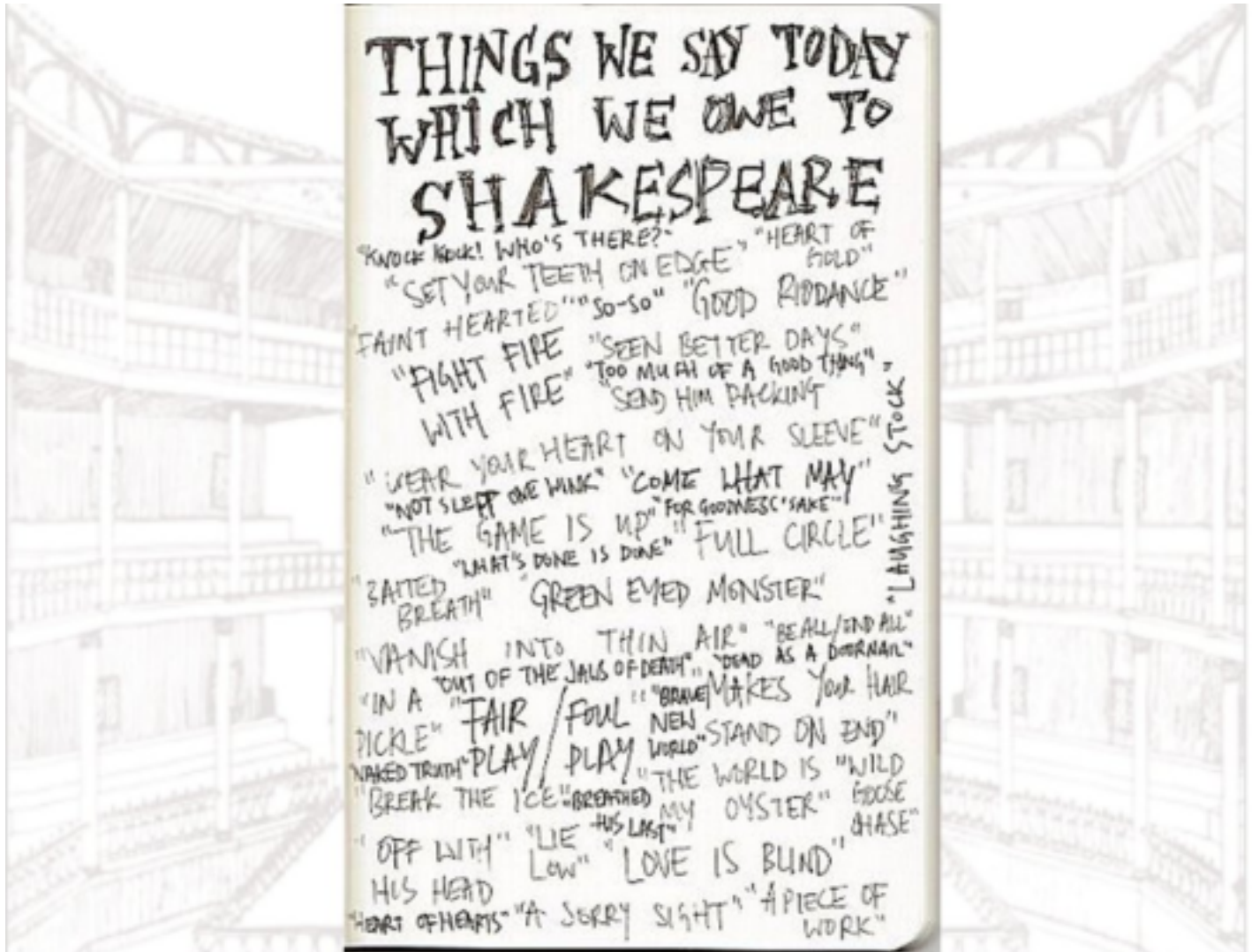


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The English writer and poet William Shakespeare is considered by many to be the greatest playwright of all time. While most people are familiar with the name of William Shakespeare, no one knows when he was born. Experts know that he was baptized on April 26, 1564 and believe that he was 3 days old at the time. This is why the April 23 date has been adopted as his officially recognized birthday. This date is also the day he died on, 52 years later in 1616.

When Shakespeare left his home in Stratford-upon-Avon for London, it is rumored that he had to leave because he was caught poaching (hunting illegally). Shakespeare married at 18 and wrote his first known play when he was 25 years old. He was a very well known actor as well as a playwright, performing in his own and other people's plays. Shakespeare worked with a company of actors called the Lord Chamberlain's Men, for whom he wrote his plays for and performed with.


Words to define: assassination

William Shakespeare's writings have been translated into more languages than those of any other author. There are over 80 different translations of his plays and poems being performed and read by people all over the world. Shakespeare used 17,677 different words to write his plays and poems, including 1,700 which he created himself (The word "**assassination**" was invented by Shakespeare). Most people use only 2000 to 2500 words when speaking and writing, but Shakespeare was able to use 7 times this number.

Shakespeare is credited with 39 plays, including *Hamlet*, *Macbeth*, *Romeo and Juliet*, and *Julius Caesar*. His plays are usually divided into three types: comedies (which have a happy ending), histories (which are based on real events) and tragedies (which have an unhappy ending). There is still much debate about which poems and plays were written by William Shakespeare as he often collaborated with other writers to create plays, which was common at that time.



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Cardenio is the name of a play that was written by Shakespeare, and performed while he was alive, but there is no copy of this play surviving today. Many people have tried to find out what the play was about but the mystery of this lost work may never be solved. If you can find a copy, keep hold of it — it's will be worth a lot of money!

Here is a really surprising fact: this great writer's wife and children were all illiterate — they couldn't read!



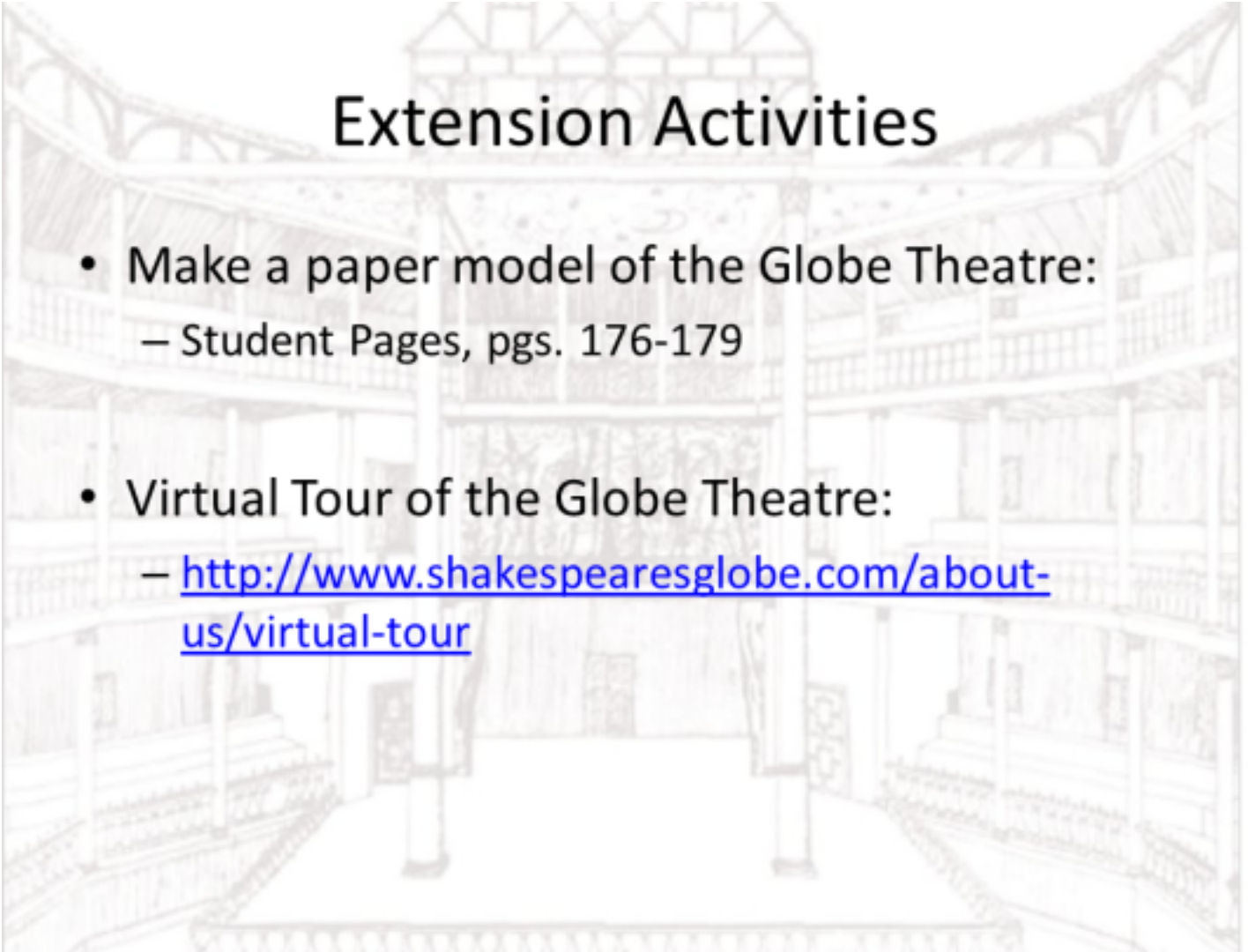
